FULFILLING THE PUBLIC HEALTH NEED

A robust financial aid program ensures that the Harvard Chan School will continue to attract the world's most promising future public health leaders, regardless of their ability to pay.

Financial support also helps ensure that students can use their talents where the public health needs are greatest after they graduate, instead of taking jobs solely to pay off school debt. Without a heavy debt burden, students can leave the School and immediately begin to improve lives and create positive change—the reason they came to the Harvard Chan School in the first place.

GLOBAL IMPACT

The ripple effect of a Harvard Chan School education reaches far and wide. For example:

- School alumni led successful efforts to eradicate two major diseases: smallpox, which saw its last case in 1980, and guinea worm disease, which killed 3.5 million as recently as 1986 but is now on the verge of elimination.
- Alumni have held posts at the minister or secretary of health level in Afghanistan, Colombia, India, Indonesia, Papua New Guinea, Taiwan, and Thailand, representing a combined population of more than 1.7 billion people.
- The Thai Scholars Program was established in honor of King Bhumibol Adulyadej and Prince Mahidol of Songkla. Together, they introduced public health and modern medicine to Thailand—influencing the health, prosperity, and longevity of Thai citizens. The dramatic improvements in Thailand can be traced to their remarkable contributions. Support for students studying at the School will help continue public health advancements across the globe.
